

CHGLISH LANGUAGE

The children of this group are diligent and eager, allowing them to take bigger leaps in learning the language. Being the older, mature ones, they take a steady approach towards discovering what English has to offer.

They have a keen interest in reading and are able to pick up new words. Their spelling and pronunciation has improved over time. They are able to construct sentences and stories though a couple of them are still learning the ropes.

In the translation activity a few of them are particularly good and others are still catching on. They are now more comfortable with the usage of the correct tense. Show active interest in grammar classes and have a burning curiosity to listen and learn new things. They have all taken up reading and that has helped them considerably.





ART APPRECIATION

There are two parts to Art Appreciation - Theory and Practical

a. Theory- Various concepts like foreground, middle ground, background, perspective, proportion, three dimensionality, colour, light and shade, profile and front view etc were introduced through activities/games like "Look and Describe", "Perceive and Analyse." The concept of light and colour frequency and wavelength, reflection and refraction, colour perception, structure of the eye was explained citing daily scientific encounters [rainbow is a refraction of light] and carrying out minor science experiments [mixing] primary colours of slight]

The idea of historical time with large and small units was introduced [Prehistory and History, A.D or C.C and B.C or B.C.C, Ancient, Medieval and Modern]. Art history, cave paintings, Egyptian art and Greco- Roman Art was covered. The instruction of Renaissance art movement has begun. Each movement is introduced using an array of images, historical anecdotes and short documentary/art historical films.





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The group makes regular, brief entries in their diary about various art movements and styles. The teaching of art is not considered as an isolated event but is intertwined with history, politics, geography and science. The discussion on Cave paintings begin with historical division of time as Palaeolithic Age, formation of natural caves through the wearing of the rocks, spatial location of the caves under study. Similarly, discussions on Greco -Roman art begin with understanding the extent and might of the Roman Empire and Renaissance follows on the heels of Reformation, scientific discoveries and explorations.

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




A "Word Wall" was made to help revise Elements of Art and other concepts integral to their course.

b. Practical - Still life, portraits and nature drawing have been practised using careful observation and study. Parallel to the art movement in theory, the practical comprises of re-appropriating the style [classical Greek, ancient Egyptian, cave art, perspective and proportion of the Renaissance etc] and adopting it to immediate surroundings and locales. Activities followed include re-imagining one's village if conceived by Egyptian hands, re-creating cave paintings using simple materials like natural, organic colours and twigs and so on. The result of the latter was an artistic transformation of a huge hostel wall treated with scenes replicating quotidian village life and surroundings. The mural work is a laborious effort of feet.





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To understand the principles of Renaissance art, an engagement with perspective drawing was followed by anatomical studies. Live sketching was introduced by placing Faith group pupils in other learning groups as silent observers of anatomy and human postures. Such a novel exercise was initially met with hesitation and embarrassment to later transmute into enthusiasm and confidence. The complex human body was simplified and hence de-mystified using lines as well as shapes. The once frightening exercise of figure drawings has gradually come to be more approachable.

There had been an initial aversion to water colours probably with the lack of acquaintance with the joyous medium. Simple technique demonstrations and encouragement has helped them to explore the medium readily.





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The group so far has had little exposure to art and elements of art. They had confined themselves to decorative and "pretty" pictures. The group has been successfully training their eyes to observe the shape, forms and colours in nature and objects.

A wide range of everyday objects like pencils, spoon, and scissors has been studied as well as landscape and human figures have been sketched. Though most of their work has employed pencil sketching or oil pastels, water colour as a formal technique has been introduced recently.

MATH

The children are at different levels, while one child is currently doing Book-8, two each are doing Book-6, 5 and 4.

The ability, independence, speed and accuracy vary from child to child. Some of them forget the concept and process of calculation and need to be reminded again and again.

To give the children practical experience on money operations and handling, we played the role of a buyer while other groups set up a market. Keeping record of more than Rs. 1000 was difficult for many.






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HOME SCIENCE

The group comes for home science twice a week. During the session October to March three topics were taken up. They enjoyed different activities done along with practical's like cooking in different ways, cleanling, performing the responsibilities in the family.

- Care of young children in family members
- My relationship with family

Under activities and practical for this we made the family tree using the dolls made of old cloth. In the family tree all the members relationship in mother's family and father's family were introduced.

Method of Cooking - Following points were focused in this topic

- Importance of cooking
- Methods of cooking
- Advantage and disadvantage of different type of cooking
- Cooking by moist heat Stewing, Steaming, Pressure cooking
- Cooking by dry heat Baking, Roasting, Grilling
- Frying

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In activities and practical - Children made charts on methods of cooking. They learnt egg dishes like Swiss omelet, Indian omelet, Latki. They also made spice tea using the lemon grass, cardamom, tej pataa and ginger etc. They also made chilla, potato chips, palak pakoda, pulao.

Health & Diseases

In this topic the students were introduced to :-

- a) Health and hygiene
- b) Disease
- e) Different types of disease deficiency disease, communicable And non –communicable disease
- d) Their symptoms
- e) Its prevention and treatment
- f) Care of a patient

Under activities and practical they prepared charts for classification of disease, deficiency and communicable diseases





ODIA PANGAAGG

Faith group students have started preparing for NIOS exam. We have covered three chapters from the syllabus of NIOS in the last session.

These chapters are :-

- a) Mada handi katha (folk talg)
- b) Khadyotika (poem)
- c) Rebatu (story)





Through these chapters the students have learnt

- a) some grammar concepts
- b) explanation writing
- c) writing skills through question and answer method
- d) reciting a poem
- e) making a play and enacting
- f) new vocabulary

SPORTS

The girls of this group are very active when it comes to games and rarely miss their game slot. They play Football, Basketball, Volleyball and a range of minor games. They also go running and practice dance.



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All of them enjoy Basketball and most of them are very good in the game and some even extend their superiority in football. They are able to follow a simple motto 'Stay cool, stay calm' as they weave and pass the ball around, running for offence or holding the defence.

Recently, Volleyball had been started and there too, they have shown promising signs. They heed well to any advice given but instead of blindly following, they tune it to their own style and improve on a self-learnt basis.

The entire day was packed with celebrations, fun and joy. The girls participated in various demonstrations.

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In the afternoon they were doing social studies with Mr. Ashok Achaya.


Barun Pal ji - Focussed on harmonisation in vocal music.
